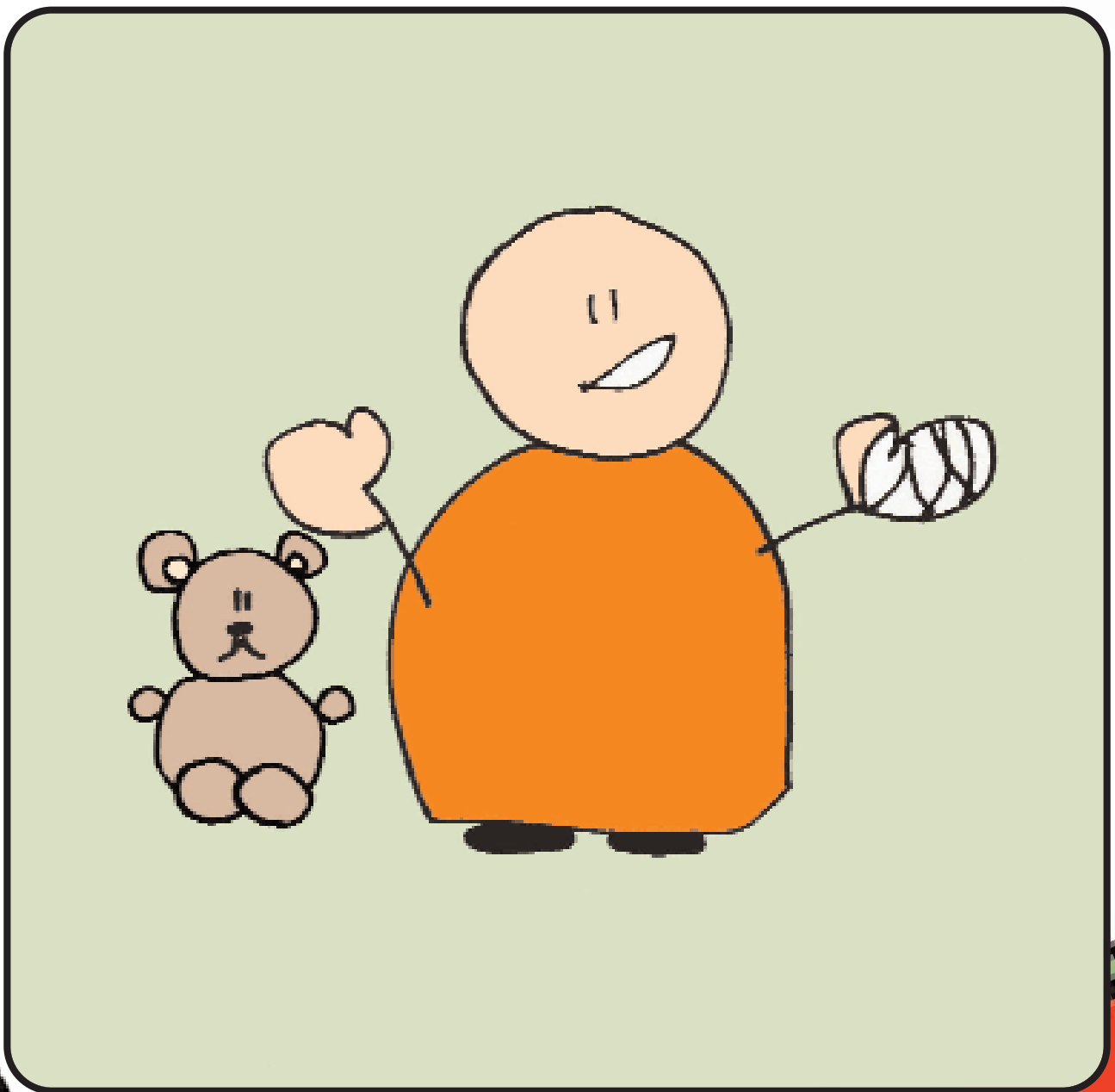


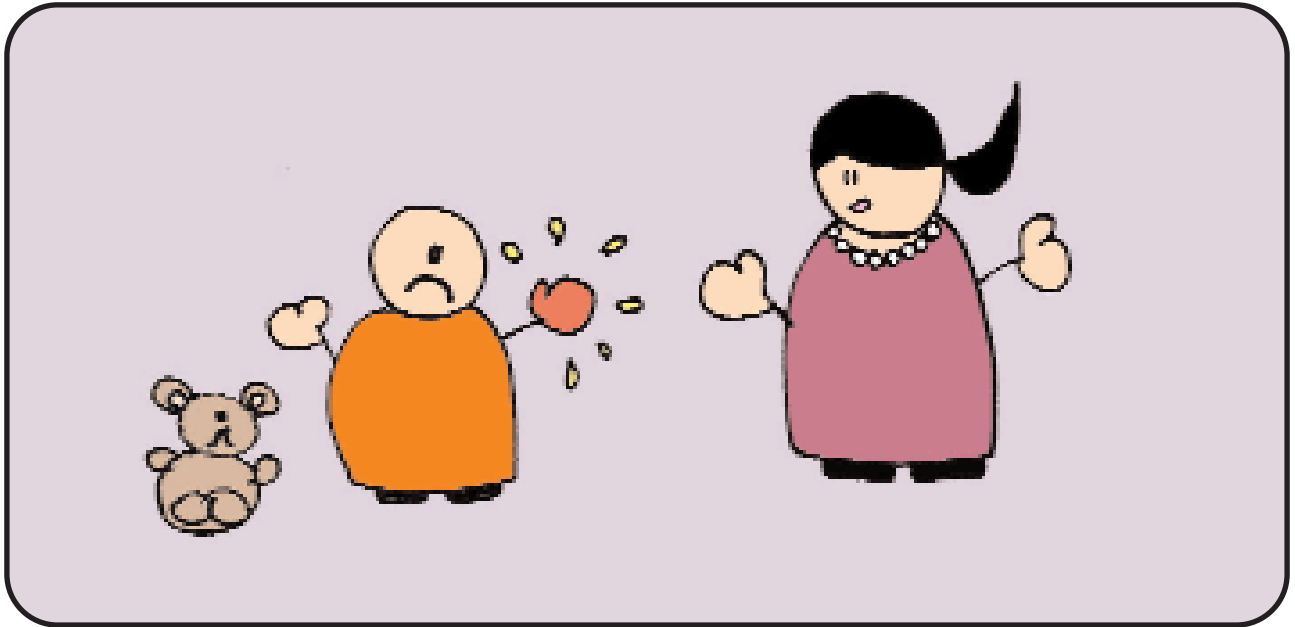


Timmy's operation



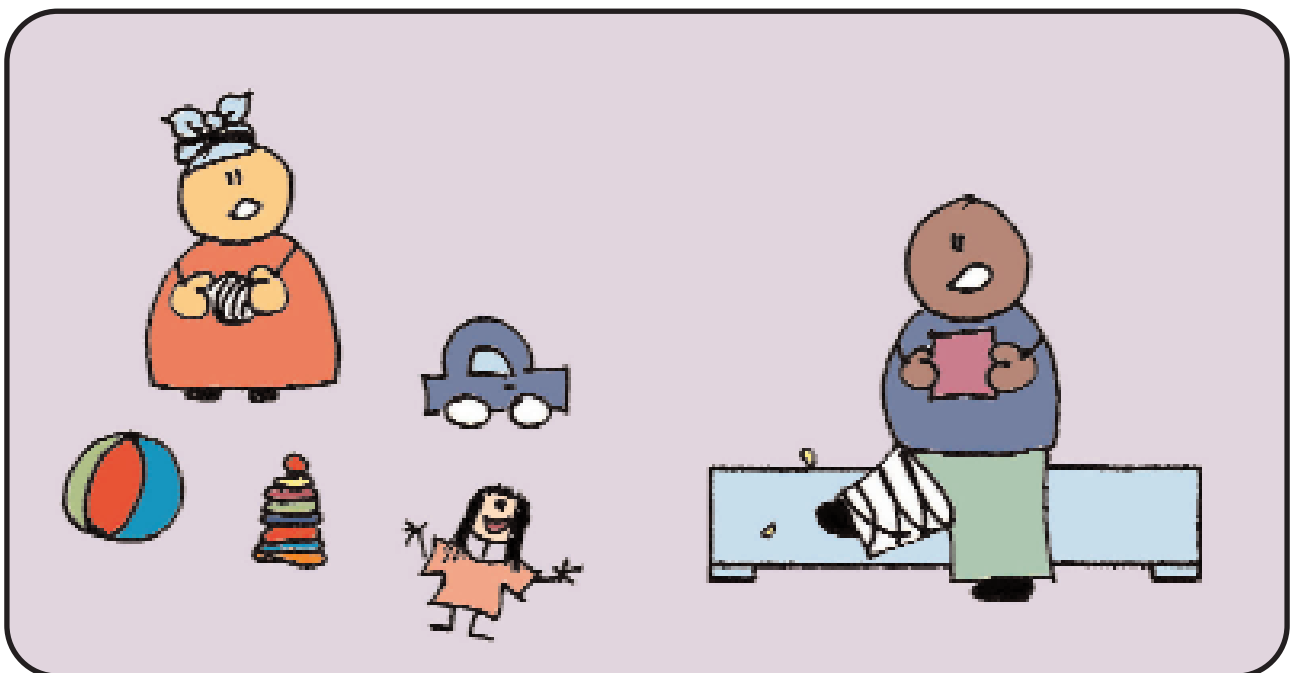
Timmy hurt his hand.

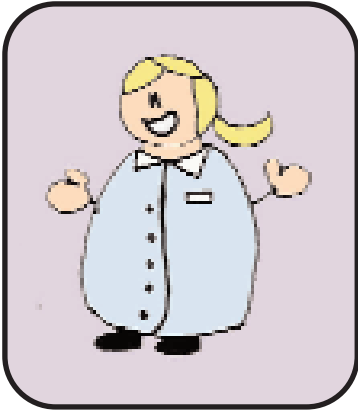
His mum took him to the children's hospital for an operation to make his hand better. Teddy went along too!



There were lots of other children at the hospital. Some were in the playroom, which was full of toys.

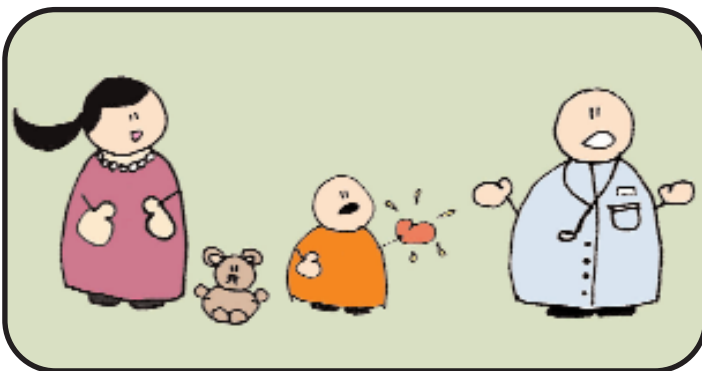
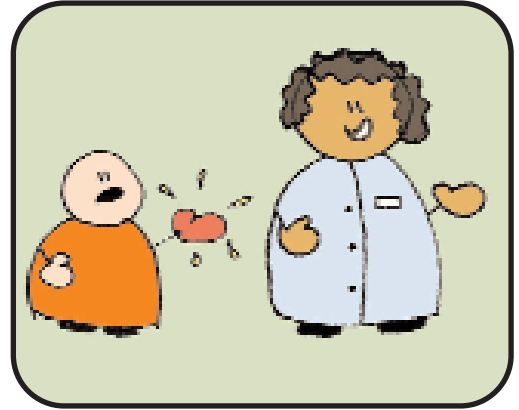
What toys can you see?





Nurse Gemma showed Timmy and his mum to his own bed. The doctors came to see Timmy.

Dr Smith, the anaesthetist, told Timmy about the anaesthetic. She said “The anaesthetic is the medicine I give you before the operation. It will send you into a special sleep and I will wake you up when the operation is over.”



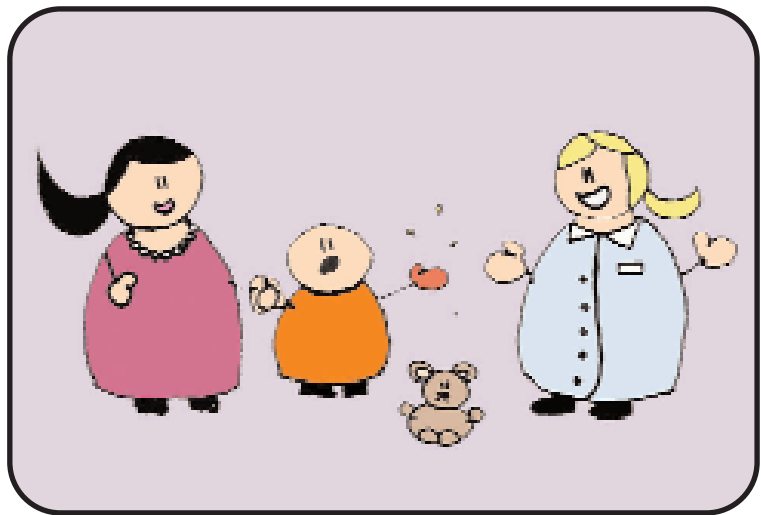
Mr Jones, the surgeon, also came to see Timmy and checked his hand. He told Timmy and his Mum how he would make his hand better

Nurse Gemma put Emla cream and a clear plaster on his other hand. It is sometimes called ‘magic cream’, because it helps to stop your hand from hurting when you have an injection.

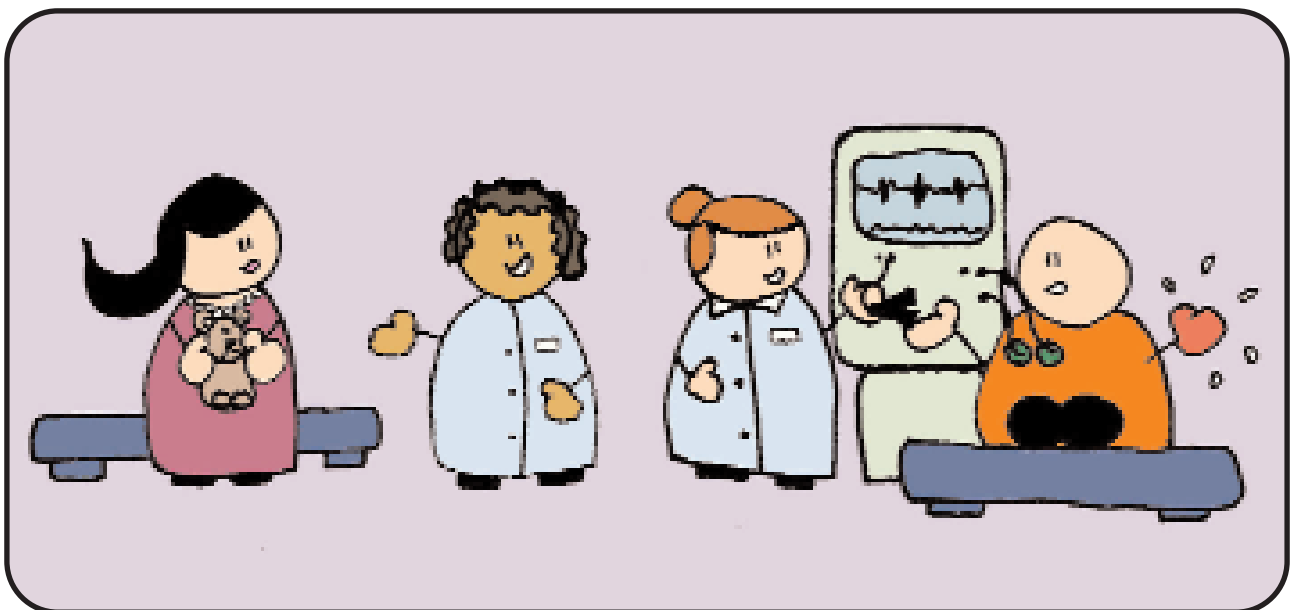
She also put a bracelet on Timmy’s wrist with his name written on it.



Timmy told Nurse Gemma that he was scared. She said “It is OK to be scared of some things. Lots of people get scared. The nurses and doctors will look after you.”



Mum, Nurse Gemma and Teddy went to the anaesthetic room with Timmy. This was a small room next to the operating theatre. He met Amy in the room. She told Timmy that she would be helping Doctor Smith.



“This machine helps us look after you” said Amy. She put some sticky pads on Timmy’s chest and a rubber peg on his finger. The machine made ‘bleeping’ noises.

Dr Smith took the plaster and Emla cream off Timmy's hand. Timmy felt Doctor Smith put a small plastic tube there. Dr Smith then put some cold medicine through the tube and into Timmy's hand. The medicine made Timmy fall asleep.

Sometimes Dr Smith asks children to breathe in some special air from a mask. This is also an anaesthetic and sends you to sleep for the operation.

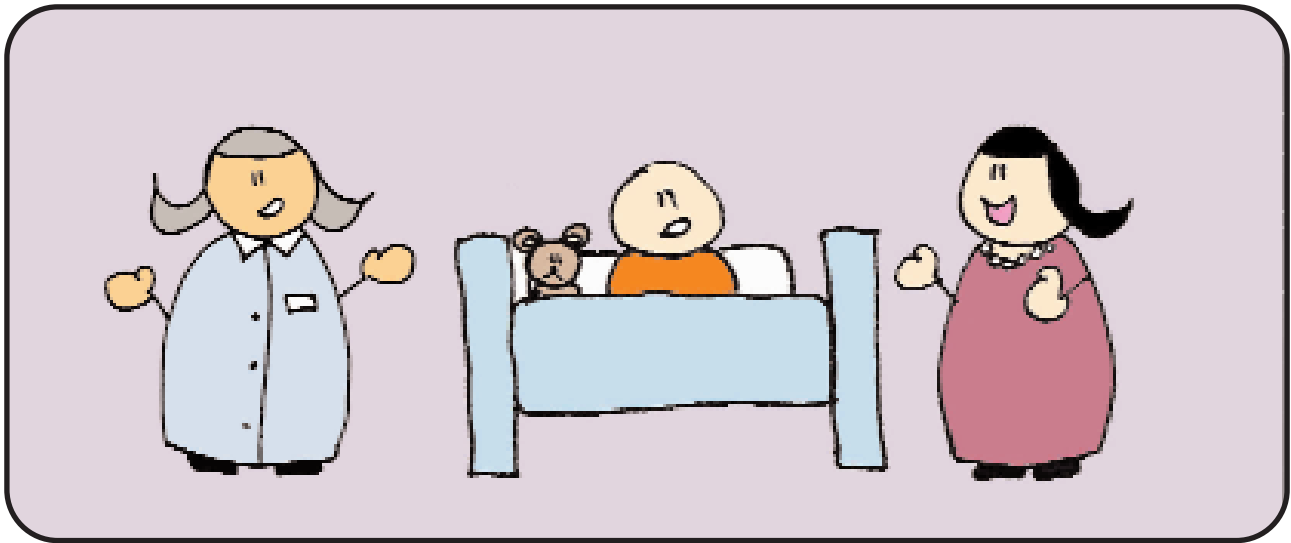
During the operation, Timmy slept and he did not hear, feel, or see a thing.

When the operation was over, Dr Smith took Timmy into the 'recovery room'. He had a special recovery nurse, called Nurse Jane, to look after him.

Timmy woke up slowly and when he opened his eyes Mum, Teddy and Nurse Jane were with him. Timmy felt a bit sleepy, so he stayed in bed.



Timmy still had the small plastic tube on his hand, so Nurse Jane put a bandage over it to keep it safe.

When it was time, Nurse Gemma took Timmy back to the ward with Mum and Teddy. Timmy's hand felt a bit sore so Nurse Gemma gave him some medicine. He soon felt better and played with his toys again.

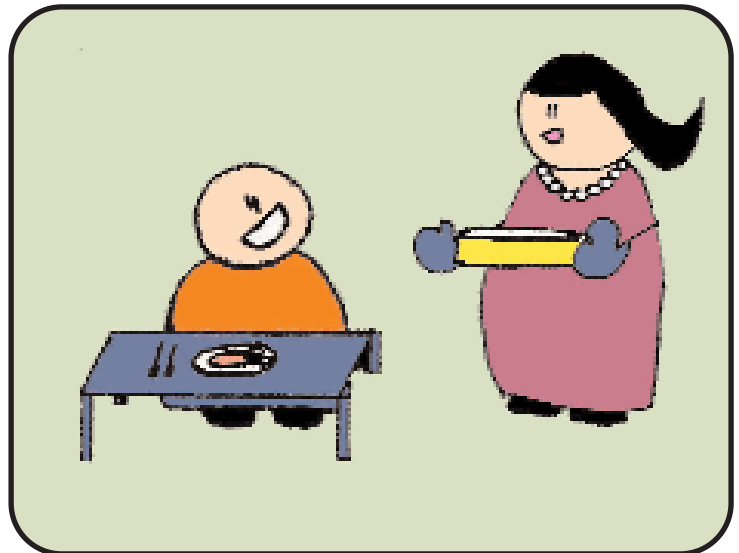
The surgeon came to see Timmy and said he could go home.

Nurse Gemma gave Timmy a present, can you see what it is?

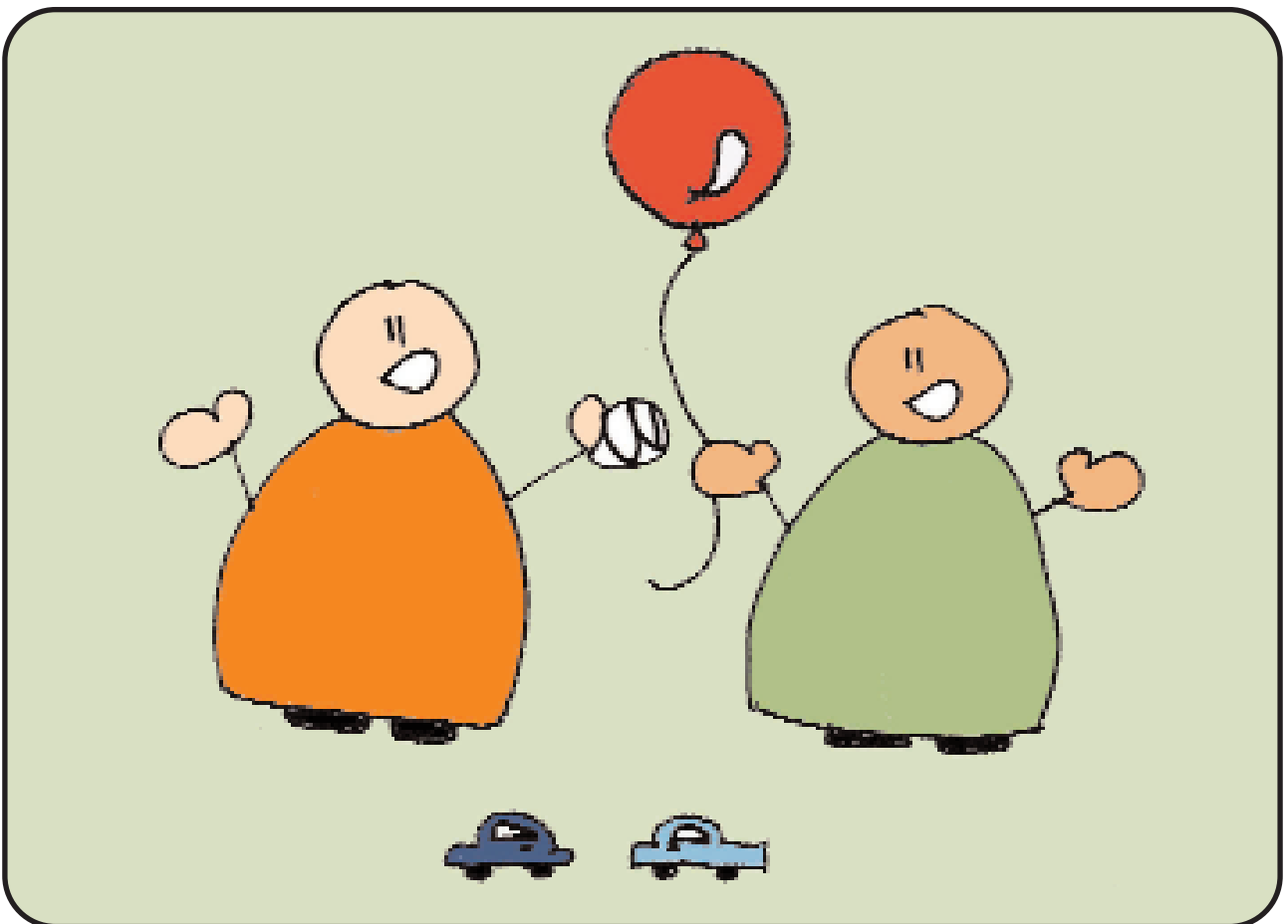


When Timmy got home, his Mum made him his favourite meal.
