

Young onset urology (YOU) clinic

This leaflet introduces the young onset urology clinic at the Evelina London Children's Hospital, and explains what to you should expect when you attend. If you have any further questions, please speak to a doctor or nurse caring for you.

What is the young onset urology clinic?

The young onset urology clinic has been set up to support young people with long-term urological conditions as they make the transition (transfer) from paediatric (children's) urology services to adult urology services. This is a nurse-led outpatient clinic which runs on the last Friday of every month, subject to prior booking.

The clinic offers the opportunity for young patients and their families to meet with the young onset urology clinical nurse specialist before moving over to adult services. She will provide ongoing support and follow-up care in adult urology.

What can I expect from the clinic?

The clinic should be used as a forum for you and your family to discuss any problems and/or concerns that you have currently, or that you anticipate having with regards to the ongoing management of your urology condition. You will be in direct contact with the doctors overseeing your care, so any further services you may require and any necessary tests/investigations you may need, can be accessed and booked through this clinic.

Who can use this service?

Urology patients between 16 and 18 years of age may be referred to the clinic by the paediatric urology team at the Evelina London Children's Hospital. Patients and families can discuss access to the clinic with their clinical nurse specialist.

What do I need to bring with me?

Please bring your appointment letter and any medication you are currently taking. It may also be helpful to bring a list of any questions you may have about transfer to adult services.

What if I cannot make the appointment?

We will discuss with you your availability to attend the clinic on a specific date, however, we fully understand that things can come up which prevent you from attending your appointment. We therefore ask you to contact your clinical nurse specialist prior to clinic if you are unable to attend the date on your appointment letter.
